# Thursday Musical Semi-Annual 2017-18 Financial Report

#### **Comparison with Previous Year**

Time to celebrate! In comparing the income and expenses from the first half of Thursday Musical's 2017-18 fiscal year to 2016-17, we are ahead of the game. Thursday Musical's fiscal year goes from May 1st to April 30th, so the half year point referred to here is from May 1st to October 31st. Here is a description of what you will see in the accompanying graphs.



**INCOME:** The total income for the first half of 2016-17 was \$37,584.86. This year's income as of Oct. 31st was \$45,429,48. Some of this was due to the strong stock market surge.

In the first 6 months of the fiscal year, Thursday Musical had a gain in income of \$7,844.62.




**EXPENSES:** In 2016-17 our expenses for the first half of the year were \$23,167.69. This year's expenses were a little higher at \$24,277.42. This was partially due to costs for our 125th anniversary celebration.

Thursday Musical spent \$1,109.73 more in the first half of this year.


The bottom line is that our income outperformed last year. In comparing the first half of both years, Thursday Musical's fiscal position is \$6,734.89 ahead of where we were last year. That is something to celebrate! Thank you, everyone, for all you do to contribute to our organization.

#### Pie Charts of Income & Expenses 2016-17

To give you the big picture, you will find pie charts outlining both the income and expenses for last year. These figures include all updates.



**INCOME:** What is interesting is that the percentage of membership dues and investment income is almost equal at around 30%. Contributions are a significant category at almost 18%. Percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number.



**EXPENSES:** Note that the student award amounts were slightly lower with the cancellation of two categories due to low enrollment: guitar and advanced voice. Each competition category must have five registrants to run the category. We expect to give out more scholarship monies this year.

# Being Well, Being Musical

# It's about being delicious, not about cooking the perfect recipe.

# - David Chang's Unified Theory of Deliciousness (Interpreted)

I am happy, very happy, that my concerto audition last month was a flop! It's exciting. It's the best thing that could have happened. And I had worked very hard.

## Perfectly logical. Right?

I best explain. Performance anxiety. I'm talking the kind of anxiety that literally hurts, interferes with every breath, and takes over when it is time to perform. Even with my studies at New England Conservatory in piano performance, my 2 concerto performances in 2003-2004, and periodic recitals, it has hit me harder this year than ever before. My first mock audition was in front of 15 members of my church choir. I spoke with them about The Subjective Units of Distress. The SUDS scale. It can be a useful tool. I shared that as I played for them my anxiety level was an 8 out of 10! I played it again and this time it was a 4 out of 10. A few more mock auditions and my score went down - 2 out of 10. Then the audition came. I decided there simply was not time or room for the anxiety and entered the room. When I sat down beneath unfamiliar lighting, my anxiety kicked in. I had practiced the week before on the instrument. The lighting was different! The moment I lifted my arms for the Schumann's opening cascade of chords I was filled with doubts. I was analyzing, noticing the line of shadows across the keys, noticing my own reflection staring back against the glossy black finish. I was doing all of the things that take us out of that 'zone' we so enjoy when performing.

The next day I scheduled a conference call with Dr. Noa Kageyama, a performance psychology expert, and faculty at the Julliard School in New York. I explained that I am both a musician and a clinical social worker, and he agreed to share time with me,

and we spoke this past Friday. I shared my success with him, and then asked for his direct advice. He advised that I write out what I actually did before the audition and create a log - a reverse order log. I am to trace the specific result of each item on the log. This will inform what went wrong, and what to do differently starting right now. We also discussed the need to have two different mindsets - a practice mindset, and a performance mindset. We have to actively use each mindset as part of our daily discipline. Where I had not prepared well enough was the performance mindset - where we allow our mind, body, and emotions to blend in the process of creating music. A discipline of experiencing 'the zone' enough ahead of time, that anxiety simply is not a factor.

Dr. Kageyama and I talked about music across the lifespan. It's seems that as a person matures they can become more focused on what is 'good' or 'perfect', and how to improve skill deficiencies. But we must not mislead ourselves to focusing on the wrong thing. We must continuously challenge ourselves to enjoy how we perform. Keeping it delicious. Allowing the art to be art. May this be the beauty we all experience, regardless of vocation, background, stage of life (or favorite cuisine).

It's humbling to experience the very need I help others with – balancing our emotional wellbeing. It's like a hand surgeon, with an injury to the hand. 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

# Two new soloist members and one new ensemble will make their Thursday Musical debuts in Antonello Hall in January and February of 2018.

Soprano Jane Thelen (January 25) is active as a performer, voice teacher and director throughout the Twin Cities area. Jane is a long-time member of the Minnesota Opera chorus and has served as the choir director and soloist for Family of Christ Lutheran Church for 10 years, as well as directing many children's productions there. Jane's undergraduate degree is from Concordia College, and she completed her master's degree at the University of Minnesota. She has been featured in productions at Lyric Arts, Minnesota Opera, and the U of M Opera.

Pianist Amy Grinsteiner (February 8) is an Assistant Professor in the joint College of St. Benedict/St. John's University Department of Music, where she teaches studio piano, class piano, collaborative piano and Music through History. In addition to solo, concerto and chamber music performances as a pianist, Amy is involved with choral accompanying conducting and has considerable experience as a proponent of new music. Her DMA degree is from the University of Washington, and she has been part of the Seattle Piano Institute there, as well as serving as adjudicator for numerous festivals competitions throughout the Pacific Northwest and Midwest.

Amy has collaborated with fellow Thursday Musical member **Edward Turley** (CSB/SJU piano faculty) on two major projects: The Goldberg Project, involving elementary students with abstract art interpretations of the Goldberg Variations, and the annual Dennis

Alexander Piano Festival and Competition.

The Primavera Duo (February 22) is comprised of Alison Lee, piano and Lindsay Schlemmer, cello. Both musicians are doctoral students at the University of Minnesota, where they study with Lydia Artymiw (Allison) and Tanya Remenikova (Lindsay). Alison has been a Thursday Musical Young Artist Competition winner, and in 2016 won second place in the 2016 Midwest International Piano Competition. Alison holds degrees from Oberlin Conservatory and Rice University, and also performs as a piano duo with her sister, Katherine.

Lindsay Schlemmer is a founding member of the Meadowlark String Quartet, and is the Adjunct Cello Professor at Southwest Minnesota State University. She serves as Executive Director and Cello Faculty for the Southwest Minnesota String Festival. Lindsay performed live on MPR as part of the Before Bach's Birthday Bash concert series, and was a Schubert Club scholarship recipient in 2016. She also completed an internship with the Artaria String Quartet, and teaches privately in her South Minneapolis studio.

# Focus on Our Members: Vern Maetzold

I was recently asked to write a short article highlighting some of our January/February concerts. My immediate impulse was to take this opportunity to interview Vern Maetzold. His story was even more interesting and varied than I had imagined, and I am delighted to be able to share a few of his memories with you.

Pianist **Vern Maetzold** has been a member of Thursday Musical since 1970, but his memories of the organization go back much further. Growing up in Belgrade, Minnesota, Vern regularly read the music section in the Minneapolis newspaper, paying particular attention to the concerts for the coming week. His interest was such that he still remembers the names of many performers, including clarinetist Arnold Caswell, whom he met after moving to the Twin Cities in the late 1960s.

After playing on the family piano "in his own fashion," Vern began piano lessons at the age of 12 in Glenwood, MN, with teacher Nora Rahn, who was a 1921 graduate of a then new MacPhail. Nora, somewhat presciently, felt it was important to continue to play throughout your life, even if you didn't go into music. Music has always been "significant and important" to Vern, and when he moved to the Cities, he auditioned for Thursday Musical and has been performing ever since.

Vern balanced a 40-year career in social work with a position as a church pianist, performing with various orchestras, and collaborating with countless others in chamber music in addition to being a valued member of Thursday Musical.

Vern recalls performing in each of the venues mentioned in Lois Cooper's *Uptempo* article. (September/October 2014, reprinted September/

October 2017.) Temple Israel was a personal favorite: although the backstage area was cold and awkward, the acoustics were wonderful for both audience and performers.

In addition to being a lifelong performer, Vern continued to study piano. When asked about his teachers, Vern mentioned three with Twin Cities connections: Oberlin professor John Elvin (originally from the Twin Cities), Macalester's Donald Betts, and Gary Sipes of MacPhail.


Vern will be performing a collection of 5 short pieces on February 8: Preludes by Debussy and Bach, a March by Prokofiev, a Romance by Grunfeld and a Rhapsody by Brahms. This performance, representing 3 centuries of music, is a fitting reflection of Vern's decades in music.


Dr. Nina Olsen
