Composer David Evan Thomas' New Commission

Our musicians and audience loved the 125th anniversary song "Give Her the River" by **David Evan Thomas** that Thursday Musical commissioned for our Opening Concert in 2017. I decided to interview our Thursday Musical member and composer to see what he is currently working on.

We focused at first on the many, different groups over the years that have commissioned his works. That then led us into discussing the many different David had used genres in his commissions. noted he seems comfortable composing in so many of them. Thomas says the composer that sets the standard for him is Brahms, as he is master of many different genres. This current commission focuses on the art song and the voice.

David Evan Thomas' current challenge is to write a piece for the South Metro Chorale to celebrate their 20th Anniversary. Mark Bilyeu will be conducting this new work for the 60voice SATB choir. Since the South Metro Chorale rehearses south of the Minnesota River, David decided to investigate and use poems for his song cycle written by Minnesota poets that focused on the confluence of the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers. Through research at the Minneapolis Public Library he chose several poems from a collection entitled Minnesota Verse: An Anthology, ed. Maude

Schilplin, St. Cloud: Times Publishing, 1938. It was fascinating to hear his thought process in creating this new piece.

The poems he chose fit the criteria he was looking for. They are: "Spell of the River" by Leyland Huckfield (1882-1923), "I am a Weaver" by Owen Peterson, "The Tramp" by Martha Ostenson (1900-1963), "The Minnesota Near Mendota" by Elizabeth Hodgins, and "I have seen the Stars Again" by Paul Bliss. The piece is due on April 1st.

The South Metro Chorale, in a program entitled 20th Anniversary Gala, will present the world premiere of Thomas' song cycle on June 14th. It will be in the Ives Auditorium of the Masonic Heritage Center in Bloomington. More information about this event can be found at southmetrochorale.org.

Artist Series: An Evening Concert to Mark Winter's End

Carolyn Diamond was exploring the three manual Reuter organ at **Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd** on France Ave when I met her for a brief interview this past snowy Thursday. She will be featured on this recently renovated instrument on March 14th at 7 pm, the only evening Artist Series concert this year. Winter officially ends a week later, but I proclaim this a concert to mark the end of a tedious winter!

Feet and fingers will be flying as Carolyn opens the concert with **Bach's** *Toccata in C, 564.* Improvisational flourishes punctuated with moments of silence will unveil Good Shepherd's acoustic character. To give the organ a chance to "whisper and growl," —as Carolyn puts it—she will conclude the program with **Dubois'** *Fantaisie* and *Toccata* from the 12 pieces for Organ. The organ will be situated in front of the church, allowing an excellent view of the organist's feet at work. Aren't most of us astonished at an organist's ability to tame the pedals of an organ?

Carolyn had many years of piano study under her belt before her church persuaded her to take up the organ as a high school student in Minnesota. She retains an appreciation for the sensitivity of touch required in piano playing and brings that to the organ, an instrument that can be regarded as "mechanical" or "stiff." Carolyn's playing will disavow anyone of that notion.

Carolyn seems to be adept at balancing acts. She has managed to maintain a high level of performance on both the piano and the organ while forging strong musical connections in our area and in the highly metro competitive New York City scene, where she lived for 12 years. (It seems that she left at least a part of her heart in New York.) She has also navigated with grace through the upper echelons of organ networks that have been primarily populated by men. I am happy for the clear message that her presence will send to all women in the audience that evening. It can be done!

Also appearing on this program are mezzo-soprano Josey Poppin, a 2018 Young Artist scholarship winner and the Meadowlark String Quartet. Violinists Te-Chiang Liu and Hsin-Yin Min, violist Kelsey Farr and cellist Lindsay Schlemmer will treat us to Three Idylls by the British composer Frank Bridge. I will also offer a few

Jenna McBride-Harris, horn

French horn player Jenna McBride-Harris made her Morning Series debut on March 7th, 2019. Jenna describes her return to Minnesota in 2017 as a bit of a homecoming, having graduated from St. Olaf College, and she is enjoying reconnecting with the music community in the Twin Cities and with former friends and teachers. Jenna went on to complete her doctoral degree at The Ohio State University and held positions with various orchestras throughout the Midwest. She is now teaching at St. Olaf College, the University of Northwestern-St. Paul, and the College of Saint Benedict/Saint John's University, and performs regularly with both Minnesota Orchestra and Minnesota Opera. She also has a private teaching studio in St. Paul. She is the founding director of the Twin Cities High School Horn Club and is also a founding member of two new Twin Cities-based chamber ensembles, the North Star Winds and Minnesota's premiere horn trio, SixtyThreeFeet. This summer Jenna will direct a new chamber wind camp for high school brass, woodwind, and piano students at the University of Northwestern. She and her husband will also travel to Germany to teach at an international orchestra camp.

Pianist Sofia Mycyk, who also made her Morning Series debut on March 7th, is a doctoral student working with Michael Kim and Timothy Lovelace at the University of Minnesota, where she also holds a teaching assistantship in Collaborative Piano. An active recitalist and chamber musician in Canada, the U.S. and Europe, she has also worked as music director and répétiteur for Saskatoon Opera. A Winter Creative Music Residency at the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity and the Ritornello Chamber Music Festival both featured Sofia as a solo and chamber musician. In 2018 Sofia performed in concerts at the Lakes Area Music Festival in Brainerd and released her first CD. Hutzulian Watercolours. featuring solo piano music by Ukrainian composers. In describing the music, Sofia notes, "the Hutzulian people are an ethno-cultural group in Ukraine

residing in the Carpathian Mountain district. Each of the six movements in Ihor Shamo's piano suite *Hutzulian Watercolours* evokes a scene from traditional Hutzul culture, which Shamo imbues with palpable colour and textures." In addition to all her music-making, Sofia's hobbies include long-distance

running, yoga, cooking for friends, and attending concerts in the Twin Cities.



Winston Kim, piano

Canadian pianist Winston Kim, making his debut on the April 25th Morning Series concert, is also a doctoral student at the University of Minnesota, studying with Dr. Kyung Kim. He previously completed the Master of Music degree with Dr. Kim at Brandon University in Manitoba. A recipient of numerous awards and an active adjudicator and recitalist, he most recently won the Women's Musical Club of Winnipeg Scholarship Competition. As the first place winner in the Young Artist Series CFMTA Western Tour Competition, he completed a highly successful recital tour of Western Canada. He has also participated in the National Arts Center Young Artist Program in Ottawa, the Ambassador Concert Series at St. Petersburg College, Minnesota International Piano Camp and the Tuckamore Music Festival. In his spare time, Winston enjoys traveling and exploring regions and cities across Canada and the USA, which provides opportunities for meeting new people, sharing his passion for classical music, and experiencing a wide diversity of foods and cultures.

Cellist Hocheol Shin, also making his Thursday Musical debut on April 25th, received his early musical training in Korea, where he completed the Bachelor of Music degree from the Korea National University of Arts, and earned a Master of Music degree from the Manhattan School of Music. While in New York, Hocheol was appointed principal cello of the Manhattan Symphony, Manhattan Opera Orchestras, and the Manhattan Cello Ensemble. A winner of numerous performance prizes, Hocheol has been a concerto soloist with various orchestras in Korea and the Twin Cities, and has been featured in several summer music festivals. He is currently a DMA student at the University of Minnesota, studying with Professor Tanya Remenikova, and serves as principal cello of the University's Symphony Orchestra and Opera Orchestra. Hocheol's playing will be featured as part of Minnesota Public Radio's Minnesota Varsity Showcase Concert, to be broadcast live on May 11, 2019.



Salon Series: The OK Factor

Thursday Musical Salon Series welcomes **The OK Factor**, a classical cross-over duo featuring **Olivia Diercks**, cello and **Karla Colahan**, violin, performing this spring on the April 4th Salon Series Concert.

Within their six years of writing, performing, and regional touring, The OK Factor has been in residence with Minnesota Public Radio's Class Notes Artists program ('16), The Grand Theater in Wausau ('17), College of Saint Benedict ('17) and Luther College ('18), sharing their intimate performances, outreach activities, and educational workshops with these communities. Their distinct compositional and performance style awarded them the honor of being finalists for the prestigious McKnight Fellowships for Musicians in 2018!

Both Olivia and Karla started training in cello and violin at ages 4 and 5 in the Suzuki method. Olivia states, "The earliest memory I have is from four years old singing a song called "I Love My Cello" while hugging the instruments and then being allowed to pluck all the open strings at the very end." On the other hand, Karla recalls, "practicing my sister's piano music by ear. My parents thought I could use those skills on another instrument and chose violin."

Both Olivia and Karla benefited from having families that were musical. Each of them shared a favorite musical memory ranging from blasting James Taylor, The Beatles, Joni Mitchell, Marc Cohn (you name it) and dancing to the *Top Gun* soundtrack in the living room. Additionally, Olivia shared her genuine appreciation for her parents, "my parents fostered a deep appreciation for many different genres in all of us... taking us to various concerts and always listening to all different kinds of music in the house. This love of music has changed our lives and led to my career." I'm sure that many of us if not all of us can identify with Olivia's appreciation for our mentors who fostered our own training and musical education.

Karla shared an influential experience: "When I was a freshman in college, my dad, a pilot for Delta Airlines, had a layover in Louisiana one night and called me up to have a conversation with Wynton Marsalis. He just happened to be hanging out in the same hotel bar that Wynton and his band were chilling in after a performance. I'll never forget what he said - "Are you practicing your scales?" I could only answer yes, to make sure I stayed in his good graces for that moment, and then immediately went downstairs to practice my scales."

Most of us remember the first instrument we trained upon, and Olivia and Karla are no exception. Olivia remembers her first cello as a "1/2 size cello made out of plywood - nothing special in the slightest. But I played on that instrument for years!" Karla shared her longing for a shiny new violin: "I had the choice between a beat-up looking violin or a shiny new one. I wanted the shiny new one, because of course, it was so shiny and new, but I didn't pay much attention to how it sounded. My parents convinced me to listen closer to the beat-up violin and we ended up going home with that one!" Since then, Karla has been partial to older instruments.




